PHYSICS LAB EXPERIMENT

We conducted a laboratory experiment to calculate the half-life of radioactive elements as we are unable to use radioactive elements to conduct an experiment we used dice as a substitute to represent/identify the decayed atoms. Use dice as a substitute to represent the decayed atoms. To enhance the understanding of finding the half-life of a radioactive element while using practical methods to calculate the half-life and no of decayed atoms of a radioactive element by using dice. We began with 30 cubical dice and wrote down a table with titles serial number, no. of trials, and no. Of undecayed atoms. Once rolled; separate the dice displaying 6, count the number and subtract by the total number of dice- 30 and note in no. of decayed atoms column; repeat until the count reaches zero –even repeated numbers were mentioned to calculate the exact half-life in the graph. Once there are zero dices left, we began plotting the values on a graph with the x-axis as no of trials and y-axis as no. of undecayed atoms, plot values, and draw the line of best fit. Then divide the highest y-axis value by two and plot the point (divided value) and draw a triangle connecting its corresponding value on the x axis, the value derived is the half-life of radioactive elements.
